Behaviour:

At the beginning of the year all staff members spent a day with Educational Psychologists from the Ministry of Educations Learning Support team. The purpose of this day was to learn about MOE guidelines "Understanding Behaviour & Responding Safely" (UBRS). The programme unpacks things like identifying triggers for difficult behaviour and redirecting children away from these behaviours, understanding why the behaviour is occurring, and putting strategies in place so children can experience success and lessen the chances of the unwanted behaviours occurring. A integral aspect of the UBRS programme is that it is designed so that we can provide a school environment that is inclusive to all students where we encourage and support diversity.

In term 1, I shared our updated behaviour expectations document with the community. Here is a link to this document if you haven't already seen it - <u>Behaviour Expectations</u>.

A key aspect of this document is for staff to concentrate on and praise good behaviours the children display. Unfortunately there are instances when some children display unwanted behaviour. This is when we apply aspects of the UBRS programme.

We have 5 wonderful learning coaches who assist some of our children with their learning and sometimes behaviour. We are able to identify when children are "out of sorts" and in these cases we place a learning coach with the children to help them regulate their behaviour.

If the behaviour escalates teachers and learning coaches can send an orange or red card (as in the behaviour expectations document) to the office. The office staff give the card to either myself Kate Excell or a member of the senior leadership team. The purpose of the card is to provide assistance to the teacher and learning coach. Assistance can include:

- checking on where a child is
- working in class with a child
- teaching the class so the teacher can work one on one with a child or working with a group of children
- removing a child from the class to help them regulate their behaviour

The main purpose of the red and orange card system is to help keep everyone safe. In instances where the office receives a red card there are at least three adults involved to ensure the safety of the students. Break times:

The field at break times is usually a very busy space. There can be as many as 4 different games of football happening at once. These games of football can sometimes become competitive and heated. To help monitor these games there is a teacher on duty who stays at the field. This teacher has yellow and red cards that they can use to give children time out from a football game. The amount of time they sit out is dependent on which card was given and why. The times can vary between 5 minutes or the rest of the break and sometimes including the next day. We understand that sometimes children use inappropriate language during football games and the duty teacher is there to monitor this.

We have 2 teachers on duty at break time - one at the playground area and one on the field. These teachers wear high vis vests so they are easily identifiable to the children. In addition we have staff who supervise areas within the school. These teachers do not wear high vis vests as they are supervising a specific area. For a school our size we have more than enough adult supervision at break times. We can not have adult supervision in every area of the school 100% of the time and sometimes we don't see things that have happened, but we are always available to help if it is reported.

For the majority of time children are playing positively and displaying the PAUA values. All staff are proud of the way in which children interact and play positively and this is something that we continue to work hard at maintaining.


